

Strickland signed a bill that creates a statewide database for the information, with participation being voluntary.

Ohioans will be asked for contact information for at least one person when they visit a Bureau of Motor Vehicles office.

A Mechanicsburg woman,
Carmela Wiant, was instrumental
in the passage of the bill. She lost
her son, David Money, in a
car crash on Aug. 7, 2006.
Wiant and Linda
Wuestenberg, mother of
acident victim "Stevie B."
Burge worked with state
Sen. Keith Faber and state
Rep. Jim McGregor to get
the bill developed.

Both Wiant and Wuestenberg said there was a gap of hours between the time of the crashes that killed their sons and the notification to them by law enforcement.

"I started the bill with Senator Faber April of 2007 and it passed exactly one year from the day I started April 2008," Wiant said. "Governor Strickland signed the bill May 1, 2008."

Wiant said people may start Sept. 8 to put contact information on the driver's license by calling in, stopping in or doing it online. A person doesn't have to wait until the time of license renewal to do so, she said.

Wiant said her son David loved baseball and played for 14 years. He had talked to the Columbus Clippers about what it takes to "get into the (Cincinnati) Reds."

"Which that week he was going there to interview with them," she said.

Wiant and other friends of her son were present for the signing of the bill by the governor.
